Reflections on the 1975 Nationals

The 1975 Canadian National Parachuting Championships were held at the Abbotsford Sport Parachute Centre, in the beautiful Fraser Valley in sunny British Columbia. With slightly less than perfect weather, we completed this Meet in an unhurried 6 days - a definite record for our Nationals.

This Nationals was dedicated to the memory of Glenn Masterson. Glenn competed at the first ever Nationals, also held in Abbotsford, many years ago, and I am sure he would have appreciated this small token of our esteem.

Ours is a multi-faceted sport, whereby a participant may strive to gain fun, recreation, or competitive excellence; and need not be a serious competitor to participate. However, the quest for excellence is still one of the most exciting and rewarding areas of the sport. Being involved with the competitor segment of our sport is always interesting and rewarding, and Nationals '75 was no exception.

To me, it was many things....

Beautiful countryside, B.C. type hills (mountains?) and Ontario type clouds cranky Mount Baker acting out its menacing role as a volcano (stoked up, no doubt, by Hanne and Bill who thought of everything) a hodgepodge of people, licence plates, accents, and even mother tongues; all talking the common language - exit, transition, turn, sink, reach, strato-star, foil, rag, boogie, function, chop away, flare, crash and burn, tuck, dive, loop, collapsed cells, far out, quadrant, bag, pod, reef, mods, hang it out, leap, jump, dive, sequential, grip, slot onlookers feeling like foreigners and jumpers revelling in their own environment; listening, learning, cutting, tying and modifying like crazy ugly airplanes that fly pretty, and pretty airplanes that fly ugly the Twin Otter from AirWest being in the first category, and any other airplane falling into the second category once you've seen the Otter familiar faces and new faces, happy faces and sad faces; but, few complaining faces Fussball and Calcuttas showering with a friend to conserve water our Air Traffic Controller President ATC'ing the air-to-ground system with such precision that the pilots were going on the dials (those are the things with the needles behind the glass, Andy) Judges and Recorders alternately burning to a crisp and shivering, and pretending they were having fun; competitors alternatively burning to a crisp and shivering, and really having fun Don Rochester's familiar, purposeful, Meet Director's figure striding out to the bowl bikini-clad figures distracting the people at the bowl shorts-clad judges distracting people as far away as Chilliwack Frank and Elsie Ellis making a day of it on the DZ after the opening ceremonies; both with better than fifty years of looking to the sky, and both still interested and enjoyably interesting the U.S. Freefall Exhibition Team demonstrating their fantastic sequential maneuvers to show us where we are going Jerry Bird's "Wings of Orange" team showing us where we are our teams showing us that Canada is there too, with World Class times and skill Gjerluf Mortensen's nine dead centres back-to-back, only to be beaten by Craig Armstrong's 7 centimetre total the yells and whistles of success filtering down thousands of feet from jumpers still in freefall the superb performance by the "Joint Venture" team, leaving everyone happy for them P.A., aircraft, packing area, humming smoothly; leading to unheard of calls from the judges of "slow down" and "did you say we're not starting until 8:30 tomorrow?"

Banquet on Friday, with all awards being handed out; everyone knows that is impossible!

Hanne and Bill Hardman, the superhosts;

The staff and jumpers at Abbey who made us welcome;

The super pilots and their superb flying machines;

All the workers who manifested and recorded and fetched and carried, and were the primary key to success;

The competitors who make or break even the best organized meet;

The judges who put the metres up early and take 'em down in the dark (and only carry those white canes as a joke);

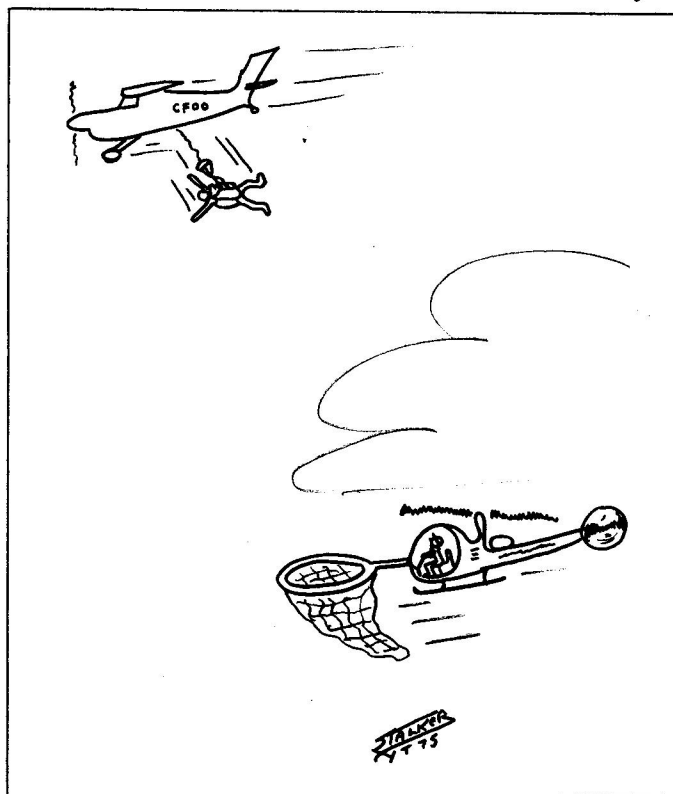
The B.C. Government for the great banquet;

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'75 Nationals Meet Director's report

Don Rochester

GENERAL

1. The 1975 Canadian National Parachuting Championships and the Canadian Collegiate National Championships began on July 26th and finished on July 31st at Abbotsford, BC. Meet organizer and host was the Abbotsford Sport Parachute Centre (1972) Ltd. (Hanne and Bill Hardman, Paul and Gail Hindle).

AIRCRAFT

4. The following aircraft were used:

Twin Otter	- 1
C 207	- 1
C 206	- 2
C 180	- 1
C 170	- 1

5. Within the relatively small numbers of contestants involved, the constraint on rate of jumping in all events, except 10 Man RW, was packing rather than aircraft availability. Consequently, it was only occasionally that all aircraft were in use.

6. The Twin Otter was used for 10 Man RW only, and in most cases carried only one team because of runway limitations on the DZ. When it had to go to Abbotsford Airport for refuelling, two teams were embarked from the Airport. Although it was suggested that it would save time to fly all teams double from the Airport, it was felt that the time taken to obtain landing and take-off clearance would override any time saved by the double load.

FACILITIES

7. The DZ has its own airstrip. 10m pea gravel bowl, indoor and outdoor packing tables, rigger's shop. There is ample camping space, and some covered sleeping accommodation. Toilets, washrooms and (hot?) showers were available. A snack bar was in operation and a large tent with tables and chairs served as a rest area. A fully equipped recreational trailer served as a headquarters for the judges at the bowl.

8. Communication was provided by line between manifest, aircraft and bowl. The latter was used to despatch individuals and teams from the aircraft in Style and RW. It was very useful in directing aircraft into observable areas when clouds were present.

9. The B.C. brewery strike inhibited the supply of beer but substitute beverages were stocked for evening relaxation periods.

EVENTS

10. Relative Work. Since this is an RW year for the World Championship, priority was given to this event.

10 Man a. This was run from the Twin Otter on the first two days of the meet.

b. Unfortunately, on the second day with five teams left to go in the last (6th) round, a sudden storm brought jumping to a halt. Had it not been for the storm, the event could readily have been finished that day. Since the Otter was not due to return until Friday 1 Aug., a consensus was sought from the team captains. They were in favour of calling the event at the end of the 5th round and this was done.

c. The rate of despatch for the 10 Man teams was one per 18 minutes.

4 Man

a. This event was run from 206 and 207.

b. Although it was begun on Monday, July 28, on completion of the 10 Man, increasing cloud forced a change to Accuracy until later in the day when it cleared sufficiently to continue the 4 Man. The same problem occurred on Tuesday and Wednesday. The final round was completed on Thursday morning.

c. Rate of despatch was one team per 8 minutes using three aircraft.

11. ACCURACY

a. This event was run from 170, 180, 206 and 207.

b. Accuracy was run on Monday and Tuesday (28 and 29) when the ceiling was too low for other events.

c. The rate of despatch was one jumper per minute using for the most part three aircraft and sometimes, four.

12. STYLE

a. This event was run from 170, 180, 206 and 207.

b. It was begun on Wednesday 30th and finished on Thursday 31st.

c. Because of the few entries, packing dictated the rate of despatch which was one per four minutes using two aircraft.

PROTESTS

13. No formal protests were made to the Jury. However, the judges granted some re-jump requests.

14. The only problem that arose concerned the Wings of Orange in the matter of using altimeters and the participation of some of their members in demonstration jumps by the U.S. Relative Work Demonstration Team. These points were resolved to the satisfaction of all, early in the Meet.

15. The banquet was sponsored by the Government of British Columbia for competitors and officials at the Royal Canadian Legion Hall in Abbotsford. Aside from slow service, due to a malfunction of the kitchen equipment, it was an excellent dinner. The awards were presented by Mr. Frank Ellis who attended along with Mrs. Ellis. The subsequent party roared merrily on.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

16. In general this competition can be regarded with satisfaction from most points of view. Unusual weather changes as usual, caused some delay and uncertainty, but since many contestants were called on to do 5-6 jumps per day, it could hardly have moved at a faster pace. The arrangements made by the organizers were of high standard and complete. The judges were flexible in shifting from one event to another with minimum time loss and their decisions left little ground for dispute. The pilots were skilled in their procedures and cooperated

well with each other. The manifestor manifested skill and tact in keeping loads correct and punctual. The competitors showed a spirit of cooperation that I have not seen equalled, in packing quickly and reporting promptly; and in accepting changes of plan philosophically. The major flaw was the failure to complete the last round of the 10 Man RW. In retrospect it is easy to see how this might have been avoided: had arrangements been made to ensure that the pilots would arrive on time that morning, had an inexperienced fuel supply pump operator known how to work the pump. It could, of course, have been finished readily on Friday morning when the Otter returned. However, the fact the first place was not really in contention and the readiness of the team captains to declare the event completed, leads me to conclude that the decision was sound. Finally, I wish to convey to all who worked in the various capacities, not forgetting the competitors, my sincere thanks for your help in bringing the 1975 Championships to a successful conclusion.
